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

Note.—It may be taken that the above route is a cart road although in places it would require improvement, this could in nearly every case be made by the pioneers accompanying a force using this route. Camping grounds and water for a brigade are obtainable at every stage, though the latter might run short at certain places if there were many transport animals.

Supplies.—After the harvesting, i.e., after end of July, supplies for a regiment of cavalry or infantry should be obtainable at all stages, but a large force would have to form advance supply depôts at Birjand, Kain, Gunabad and Turbat and take transport with them for at least 4 days' supply.
