INTRODUCTION

Those of you who have bought our first book, *A Price Guide To Books Concerning British Mountaineers and Mountaineering in the British Isles 1781 - 1999*, will know most of this stuff. It's probably best therefore to cut to the chase and move to page 5.

For those of you who have joined us for the first time, however, a few words about this whole project may be of interest. There again, they may not.

WHAT ?

This book is not a concise bibliography, nor is it a concise biography. It is a guide to the likely cost of obtaining, or replacing, second hand, any one of the 800 plus books that it lists. The criteria for inclusion is that the book should be concerned with the Himalayan range of mountains, and be available in the English language.

WHY ?

This volume, its predecessor, and those to follow, were initiated in response to demands by our friends and customers for information regarding valuations of mountaineering books.

Recent years have seen a huge upsurge of interest in mountaineering literature. Today, mountaineering books are launched and marketed with all the hype that was, until recently, reserved for works of fiction. The level of interest in the subject is reflected in the various festivals of mountaineering literature that are organised worldwide—those at Bretton Hall, Wakefield,

Yorkshire, and at Banff in Alberta spring to mind. Of course, this level of interest is also reflected in the increasing financial value attributed to many books.

We therefore need to be aware of this potential value, not necessarily for reasons of avarice but to ensure that we take sound financial precautions against loss or damage. To this end, assume that in the unfortunate circumstances of having to replace all or part of your collection that you will probably have to pay towards the higher end of a valuation figure, or even more, for a very good copy.

By the same token, should you decide to dispose of your collection at some stage do not automatically expect to be offered the high end of a valuation. Believe it or not, book dealers are people too, and have to make a living.

HOW?

How are we able to make this information on likely values of so many books available?

It's a fair question.

The answer is in fact quite simple. There are no magic formulas, or obscure equations. Simply a significant investment of time and resources, undertaking constant analysis of the market in second hand and out of print mountaineering books. This has permitted us to build a comprehensive database listing recently sought prices for several thousand books. The keyword here is 'sought'. Whilst a dealer may seek a particular price we have no way of knowing if he actually achieves that price. Having said that, the awareness of the price sought leads to the general assumption that the volume in question is worth that 'sought' price, and, there follows a corresponding increase in price sought by other dealers.

WHO?

Dek Palmer is a partner, along with his wife, Dee, in Cheyne Books for Mountaineers. With twenty five years of experience ranging from municipal libraries to, at one time, running three book shops, they have now established themselves as the leading suppliers of second hand and out of print mountaineering books in the North of England.

It is this experience, and the considerable database that they have constructed over the years that provides the information used in this publication.

NOTES ON VALUATIONS

The suggested values listed in this book are based on the likely replacement cost of a book. It should be borne in mind that the information presented here is based upon the most recent prices prior to publication and that these prices will undoubtedly rise. It is very much the case that “condition is all.” A dog-eared collection of loose pages is NOT going to be worth a great deal in comparison to a finely bound and cared for volume complete with all plates, maps and dustwrapper.

Pete Boardman climbed the Matterhorn North Face whilst still a teenager and summited Everest in 1975. Along with Joe Tasker, he made the first ascent of the 8,000 ft West Face of Changabang (22,520ft) in 1976. In 1978, he became the Director of the International School of Mountaineering at Leysin. He disappeared, with Joe Tasker, on the North East ridge of Everest on May 17th 1982. The Boardman Tasker Award for mountaineering literature was established in Pete Boardman and Joe Taskers memories.

BONINGTON, SIR CHRISTIAN J.S.

1934 -

One of the best known British climbers. In the public eye to such a great extent, and having seemed to have climbed literally everywhere, the ubiquitous Boningtons' early work tends sometimes to be overlooked: first British ascent of the Bonatti Pillar on the Dru, first ascent of the Central Pillar of Freney, first British ascent of the Eigerwand. There followed a series of expeditions to the Himalayas, and Karakoram (he summited Everest in 1985) — the details of which form the subject matter of many of his books. Awarded an Honorary Doctor of Science Degree by Lancaster University in 1984 and the Lawrence of Arabia Medal by the Royal Society for Asian Affairs in 1985, Bonington received a Knighthood in the 1996 New Years Honours List.

Leadership of the 1938 Everest expedition followed. The post war years saw an attempt on Annapurna IV (24,688 ft). Subsequently his interests turned to mixing exploration of remote mountain areas with sailing his boat 'Mischief'. Tilman died in 1977 when the vessel he was sailing disappeared with all hands en route for the Falklands.

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A PUBLISHERS TALE

There are a number of highly regarded publishers in the U.K. producing high quality mountaineering books. One of the most highly respected is also probably the smallest: The Ernest Press. The Ernest Press was started in 1986 by Peter Hodgkiss and Jack Baines, who is, sadly, no longer with us. Throughout their career The Ernest Press have published a small, but significant catalogue (see the bibliography on page 145).

Of the thirty-one mountaineering books that they have published, excluding *Alpine and Fell* and *Rock Club* journals, two have won the Boardman Tasker Prize and many more have been nominated. An impressive achievement for such a small imprint.

Peter Hodgkiss has kindly provided us with a copy of an article which he originally wrote for the magazine *Loose Scree* and which we reproduce here courtesy of *Loose Scree*.

THE PERILS OF PUBLISHING

by Peter Hodgkiss

There are pleasures and perils in publishing. I'll start with the latter.

In 1986 Jack Baines and I decided to publish a facsimile edition of W.P. Haskett Smith's *Climbing in the British Isles*. It was first published in two volumes in 1894 and 1895 but we decided to combine them into one. We brought out 1000 copies of an exact facsimile with cream wove paper, red cloth covers, black end papers, rounded corners and a gold and black stamp on the front cover. It's a book to handle with pleasure, over and above the dry, humorous style and fine drawings of its contents. Publication date coincided with the 100th anniversary of Haskett Smith's first ascent of Napes Needle and with the 50th anniversary of the Fell and Rock Club's Brackenclose Hut being built. This happy coincidence coupled with good publicity and favourable reviews made for healthy sales and within a year the book's revenue had met the production cost. But this success is not the real story.

From wide reading over the years, Jack and I knew that Haskett Smith had commissioned his fellow Alpine Club member, Ellis Carr, to draw a series of mountain sketches for a Scottish edition. Also, we knew that Haskett Smith has been active in the Scottish mountains and particularly on Skye during the early 1890s. Could we find Haskett Smith's unpublished MS and Ellis Carr's drawings? What a scoop that would be.

The original publisher, Longmans, was defunct but another large firm had bought their titles. On contacting them, we were delighted to discover that they employed an archivist and even more so to find that he was eager to help. Days went by stretching to more than a week; then the phone call came—correspondence with Haskett Smith in plenty, and positively optimistic in tone, had been found, but no MS. A setback, but we weren't finished.

Through the enthusiastic archivist, Somerset House and the Alpine Club we discovered the address of Ellis Carr's great niece. Our first enquiring letter received a reply by return of post—here, obviously, was another enthusiastic searcher. Again, a series of letters, tantalising in their detail was unearthed. Ellis Carr had spent the summer of 1896 in Scotland and had written regularly to his wife describing his progress from area to area and the trials of drawing in adverse conditions, and referring to pressure from Haskett Smith for completion of the sketches. But, no drawings were found. To misquote R.L.S., the search was exciting even though we found no treasure.

Years later and perhaps over confident after other success stories, notably the Boardman Tasker award winners *In Monte Viso's Horizon* and *A View From The Ridge*, we published a first class MS, but one rather outside our metier. It was a book about exploration and travel to the Arka Tagh range on the border between Tibet and, to the north, the Taklamakan desert in the Chinese province of Xinjiang. *Arka Tagh: The Mysterious Mountains* can only be described as a publishing failure. Through no fault of the author, whose text was well researched, wryly amusing and full of interest, nor of the publisher for we had produced a fine hard back, well illustrated in colour, and had put the usual effort into publicity, sales of the book were very poor—so much so that the production costs have never been repaid. The only explanation offered was that we had stepped outside the type of mountaineering title for which we had developed a reputation and a niche in the retail book trade.

Since then, we have had two more failures, which again could be ascribed to the same cause. Now, we've learnt the lesson and move more cautiously. But still nothing disappoints us more than turning down good MSs.

I imagine that many readers wonder about the author/publisher relationship—certainly I did when I was only a collector of mountaineering books. The fact is that most MSs are sought by the publisher who knows what he can sell and what ought to be in print. Those unsolicited texts that drop through the letter box are the dangerous ones, for if they are well written and interesting but maybe peripheral to a publisher's metier, they offer great temptation but no certainty of paying for themselves, and no publisher can afford too many of those.

We have become known, and still favour, books on the history and philosophy of mountaineering—what the leading figures did and why they did it. For instance, we would like to see a biography of J.P. Farrar in print. He was a very competent and strong mountaineer, an internationalist who sought, through his editorship of the *Alpine Journal* in the jingoistic era before the 1st World War, to establish links with foreign mountaineers and who enjoyed close friendships with both the Slovenian, Julius Kugy, and the Italian guide, Daniel Maquignaz. This trio combined to make some of the hardest Alpine climbs of the day, and, from his record, many think that Maquignaz must have been as fine a climber as has been seen in the Alps. However, he had a flaw—an addiction to alcohol. The story of the joint effort by Farrar and Kugy to rescue Maquignaz from his fate is one of epic proportion, in keeping with their approach to mountaineering. There are also enigmatic qualities to Farrar's life in that his lack of chauvinism sits oddly with his record as a participant in the Boer War and with his later antagonism toward colonials, viz Australians.

In the same vein, there is the remarkable Alpine trio of Carr, Morse and Wicks, other Edwardians who littered the Alps with new routes. All that is known about this guideless trio is what appears in notes and articles in the *Alpine Journal*, or from Claude Wilson's *Mountaineering* (Wilson was an occasional companion of the trio). And there are many more such cases—the 1930s groups led by Charlie Wilson and by Sid Cross, who pioneered winter mountaineering in the Lakes to Grade V standards when such grades were unheard of and when winter mountaineering was not thought of as an activity separate from summer rock climbing. What pleasure of research and writing await some enthusiast, and what delights for us to read.
