«The Deori Chutiyas are a small and secluded tribe in the Lakhimpur and Sibsagar districts of Upper Assam. Their principal settlements are on the Majuli Island in Sibsagar, and on the Dikrang river in North Lakhimpur. They number less than four thousand in all.

«As the name implies, they are the representatives of the priestly or Levite class among the Chutiyas, who are one of the most numerous castes in these districts, numbering 87,691 at the census of 1891; and whom we know from history to have been the ruling race in Upper Assam before the Ahom invasion in the fifteenth Century. The other two divisions of the race, the Hindu Chutiyas and Ahom Chutiyas, have long lost all trace of their language and origin, and have become merged in the general mass of semi-Hinduised Assamese; but their original connection with the Deoris has never been disputed, and is freely acknowledged by themselves. The main interest attached to the Deoris is that they have preserved the language, religion, and customs which, we may presume, have descended to them with comparatively little change from a period anterior to the Ahom invasion. The Chutiya language, indeed, may fairly claim to be the original language of Upper Assam».

These people, called «Shans», and so calling themselves, though they occasionally use the term «Phoong», have a different language from the Shans proper and the Burmese, though in manners, dress, and belief they are nearly allied to the latter. They might be described as Shan-Burmese. They occupy a number of the villages about the great plains, thirty miles north of Bhamo, near Megaong and the Endawgjee, or Big Lake.

«By a tradition, more or less supported by present facts, the Naga tribe known as the Ao have from very early times had two dialects, — the Zungi and Mungsen. The legend is, that a colony of Zungi and friendly Ahoms migrated to these parts hundreds of years ago. The Zungis stopped for years at Zungi Imti, a place just behind the upper villages of the tribe, and the Ahoms resided awhile at a place now occupied by one of the upper villages called Lungmisa or Tzúmar Menden. Tzúma is what the Aos call the valley of Assam, and Tzúmar Menden means the seat or abode of Assamese, or Ahoms, as they were called before the English occupation of the valley...»
