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PREFACE.

IN the preface to the Catalogue of the Library of the Society, prepared and published in 1862, it was stated a General Index to the Contents of the first Fifteen Volumes of the Society's Transactions, combined with a Catalogue of its Maps and Charts, would be presented in due course.

Owing to circumstances inseparable from a prolonged residence in India, part of this promise only was fulfilled by the completion of the MS. Catalogue of Maps and Charts.

The want of an Index to the Society's Transactions had long been felt,—the more so from the circumstance that the majority of the earlier volumes contained each little more than a table of contents, such as would afford but little assistance for the purpose of reference. A copious Index, however, was given with each volume from 1858, while advantage was taken of spare moments to prepare for the General Index.

In March 1865 the Society thankfully accepted the very liberal offer of Bhugwandass Purshotumdass, Esq., Justice of the Peace, Bombay, and a member of the Society, to prepare and publish, at his expense, the volume now issued.

Mr Balvant Crishnaráo Pálekar, the assiduous and intelligent clerk to the Society, assisted me in the compilation of the Catalogues, while the professional aid of a gentleman in Edinburgh was availed of to complete the volume.

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Volumes II. and IV. of the *Transactions* having, the one four and the other two separate pagings, references to the second series of each volume are marked with an asterisk, (thus, ii. 64*;) to the third, with an obelisk, (thus, ii. 5†;) and to the fourth, with a double dagger, (thus, ii. 27‡.)

The great bulk of the information contained in the *Transactions* being of a geographical nature, it will chiefly be found under the name of the country, people, river, mountain, district, or town regarding which information may be sought.

In order to facilitate reference for scientific and other purposes, the leading features of the various countries, districts, and towns described in the *Transactions* have been classified under the following heads:—COMMERCE, ETHNOGRAPHY, GEOLOGY, LANGUAGES, METEOROLOGY, NATURAL HISTORY, PHILOLOGY, RELIGION; while, still further to assist this, on the following page will be found a Synoptical View of all the information of a more strictly scientific and generally interesting nature contained in the *Transactions*, with the page of the Index on which it occurs.

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- *MEETINGS OF THE BOMBAY GEOGRAPHICAL SOCIETY, SYNOPTICAL VIEW OF THE, from its institution in April 1831, to the 15th of December 1864:—
- 1831, April.—Preliminary meeting for the formation of the Society; list of the original office-bearers, i. 1, *et seq.*
- 1833, June.—Formation of a library begun; a set of meteorological and surveying instruments purchased and placed under the charge of the secretary, for the use of the members, i. 5.

- 1838, March.—Letter from the Royal Geographical Society of London regarding the printing of the Society's papers in the Royal Society's Journal, and the transmission of copies of the publication to Bombay; resolved that each member shall have the privilege of introducing a friend to the meetings, and that the reports of the Society shall be published from time to time; donations to the lib-

- 1836, *May*.—Report by the Council of the Society as to its position at this period, i. 265-274.
- 1836, *June*.—A letter is received from the Royal Geographical Society of Paris desiring to correspond with the Society, and to exchange papers, which was agreed to, i. 6, 109.
- 1837, *May*.—Report of the proceedings of the Society for 1836-37, i. 274-279.
- 1837, *Aug*.—Letters from Lord Auckland, thanking the Society for sending him copies of their second and third reports, and expressing his desire to become a member, i. 280; letter from T. G. Taylor astronomer at the Madras observatory, requesting a loan of the Society's dipping needle for a twelvemonth, which was granted, 280; on the motion of Lieut. Ayrton, a subscription list is opened for the purpose of forming a geographical library, 281; list of papers presented, 288.
- 1837, *Nov*.—Lord Auckland is elected honorary patron of the Society; donations; list of papers presented, i. 288-300.
- 1838, *Feb*.—Letters—from Mr Smyth describing the coast of Arabia between the Bay of Curia Muria and Morebat, i. 301; from Dr Arbuckle descriptive of Aden on the Red Sea, and the facilities it affords for a coal depot, 302; from Lieut. T. G. Carless containing an account of a visit to the hot springs of Kurrachee, and a lake of alligators, and a journey to the town of Beylah, 303, from J. Ross, Esq., describing geographical research in the neighbourhood of Baghdad, 306; donations, 306; list of papers presented, 307, *et seq.*

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- 1838, *May*.—Letters from the Secretary of the Royal Geographical Society of London acknowledging the receipt of certain books, and intimating the transmission of others, i. 371; from Sir A. Burnes, transmitting a copy of the native geographical work entitled, "Masalik-wo-Moomalik," 372; remarks on the work by Dr Bird, 373; letters, donations, 374; papers presented; report of the Society for 1837-38, 375, *et seq.*

- 1838, *Aug*.—Letter from Sir A. Burnes, giving a summary of the geographical labours of his mission to Cabool, ii. 72, 73; donations, 74; Rear-Admiral Sir C. Malcolm resigns his office as president of the Society, 74; it is agreed to hold a meeting for the purpose of considering the best mode of testifying the Society's sense of Sir C. Malcolm's services, 74.
- 1838, *Aug*.—An extraordinary meeting, for the purpose of hearing an address read, which had been drawn up by Dr Bird, to be presented to Rear-Admiral Sir C. Malcolm, on the occasion of his resigning the office of president; the address, i. 396, ii. 74; it is also resolved to request Sir C. Malcolm to allow his portrait to be taken for the Society, and that the sum necessary for this purpose be raised by subscription, i. 391, ii. 75; Captain Ross is elected president, i. 392, ii. 76; letter from Captain W. C. Harris of the Engineers, transmitting a narrative of his expedition into the interior of Southern Africa, and offering his services to the Society for the purpose of making further attempts, ii. 76, 77.

- 1840, *Feb.*—Letter from Captain Boyd on the lead ore found near Beyla, iii. 204; papers presented; donations, 205.
- 1841, *Feb.*—The museum which the Society had formed is, at the request of the Bombay Branch of the Royal Asiatic Society, and with the intention of better forwarding the interests of science, made over to it, i. 7.
- 1841, *Feb.*—Letters—from Mr Layard, dated Karrak, requesting the Society to provide him with certain instruments to aid him in the prosecution of his geographical inquiries, vi. 1; from C. F. Beke, dated Tadjoura, Africa, transmitting a specimen of an African plant; 2; from M. D'Abbadie, describing the town of Barberah, Africa, 3; from Major Stirling, giving an account

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- of a visit to the Falls of Sandadura, India, 5; and some geological remarks on trap rock, 7; donations, 8; additions to the Society's library, 9-11.
- 1841, *May.*—Election of office-bearers, vi. 11; donations, 12, 13.

- 1842, *March.*—Special meeting for the purpose of devising some means of evincing the Society's regard for the memory of the late Dr Heddle. It is resolved to erect, by subscription, a tablet in the cathedral or Byculla church, Bombay, with an inscription commemorative of the Society's respect for his memory, vi. 16-18.
- 1842, *May.*—The Heddle testimonial; a special meeting to be held to consider the best mode of commemorating the late Sir A. Burnes; donations, vi. 18; Dr Buist elected secretary, 19; financial statement for 1841, 21.
- 1842, *Aug.*—It is announced that 2735 rupees have been subscribed for the purpose of erecting a memorial to the late Dr Heddle, the secretary, vi. 17; donations, 17.
- 1842, *Aug.*—A special meeting for the purpose of originating a memorial to the late Sir A. Burnes; it is unanimously agreed to have his portrait painted at the expense of the Society, and hung up in their rooms, vi. 18-21.
